Why do things go wrong in the life of a church?

Often because people are self-indulgent and insist on their way...

Sometimes because people think they are more important than others and so push others around

sometimes because people see themselves as superior to others - they have more money, better qualifications, they are more capable... claim to have a deeper understanding... and so on and so on.

Or because there are factions... groups supporting one leader over another... and causing havoc behind people's back about that 'other' leader or other group – through rumour mongering or gossip or outright slander...

...the result of course is a disaster...

Churches can be **awful** places at times... //

Because – because they are made up of human beings....

And all this – and more – we've seen in Corinth as we've worked out way through 1 Corinthians.

So we've seen arguments around leadership

We've seen an attitude of superiority – elevating one style of leadership over another – and elevating some of God's gifts of the **Spirit** over **others**...

We've seen an attempt to attract and win people through clever rhetoric which pays little attention to the central message of Jesus' death on the cross which to some in the church was frankly a foolish embarrassment!

We've seen an arrogance in terms of sin – a man sleeping with his step-mother and the congregation congratulating themselves for being so 'modern' and up to date

We've seen a selfishness in regard to doing what may very well be permissible for the believer – but something that actually causes some to stumble - like eating food which had been sacrificed to idols

We've seen selfishness with regard to the Lord's Supper where people were gorging themselves on a feast while others went hungry...

So God wants to set them right about the nature of life in the body of Christ...

And as we come to the first part of 1 Cor 14 today, I want to ensure we see the chapter firmly in its context so that we understand the passage all the more helpfully:

1. Recap: gifts and love

2. Case study: tongues and prophecy

First then:

1. RECAP: GIFTS AND LOVE

Let me ask you – if God has given you a gift of the Spirit... who is it for?

Not you!

We saw in ch 12, that gifts were given for the common good.

Yes you – YOU have been given things which you love doing and are good at doing – but those things are not for YOU - for your own fulfilment, for aggrandizement; for self-promotion; for recognition; for elevation above others...

No the gifts God has given you, have been given you to bless the body of Christ – to build up the body – to **strengthen** the body – to **help** the body of Christ **function** as it **should**.

That means that no particular gift makes any one person better than others, or more important than others...

...remember from ch 12 - the eye - the hand - the toe - are all equal - are all needed - all valuable - none indispensable.

...each one, part of the body of Christ...

But that it not how the Corinthians saw things...

They were clambering over each other to get to the top of a ladder they had invented about who was more important based on the gifts they had. ///

And there was something missing... desperately, tragically missing...

Love /

Love! //

And so it is that at the end of Chapter 12, a whole chapter on gifts of the spirit and life in the body of Christ, we read:

And yet I will show you the most excellent way.

The most excellent way – as we saw last week – is the way of love and to use your gifts in love in the service of others!

You might have the most spectacular gifts of the Spirit in your church – but if you're exercising them without love – forget it... waste of time.

Whether I speak in tongues, speak a word of prophecy or knowledge, have a great faith or have the gift of generosity – if I am using those gifts for MY benefit – for the kudos or admiration or recognition I receive – then I gain nothing.

Because that's not love!

Love which is patient and kind and does not envy or boast and is not proud...

And that type of love – the love God has so clearly shown to US in Jesus Christ... will not seek to use Godgiven gifts in any other way than God intended – namely – the common good and his glory!

So let's be clear – when in 12:31, God says "Now eagerly desire the greater gifts and then here in ch 14:1 -Follow the way of love and eagerly desire gifts of the Spirit, especially prophecy he doesn't mean gifts which make YOU look great... but that they are to desire gifts that are best for building up the body... for **encouraging** and **strengthening** the **church**!

And then he gives as it were, a case study.

2. CASE STUDY: TONGUES AND PROPHECY

If the overarching principle in seeking gifts and using gifts is to build up and encourage the people of God... let's zoom in on two gifts and see how the principle works in practice!

It's really important to try to understand what Paul means by 'prophecy' and 'tongues' as there is a lot of confusion around both.

'tongues', there are two different gifts mentioned in the New Testament.

The first is that which we see in Acts 2, where the disciples were enabled by God to speak a language they had never previously known.

The purpose of that gift was proclaiming the good news of Jesus... to those who had travelled to Jerusalem for Pentecost and would then take the news of Jesus back with them to their home towns

But the gift of tongues mentioned here in 1 Corinthians seems quite different... it is a supernatural gift of a type of ecstatic speech - unrecognisable to others, unless they have the gift of interpretation... // It would **appear** to be a type of **private love language** orientated to **God**.

Prophecy on the other hand, is not a private speaking with God, but a public speaking for God – for God's people.

When we hear the word 'prophecy', you might think of a supernatural foretelling of the future. But that's not usually how prophecy is spoken about in the **New Testament**.

The gift of prophecy is more a **supernatural** insight into **God's Word**, and applying it in the **current context**: encouraging, consoling, rebuking, challenging. A bit like what we do in preaching today! //

in the OLD Testament, prophets spoke as the Word of the Lord - take it or leave it, In the NEW Testament, prophecy was much more common, and was, as Paul goes on to instruct: to be weighed up, and sifted through before it was accepted.

The Corinthians are **fixated** with tongues, but Paul wants them to pursue **prophecy**.

Why? Verse 4 ...

Anyone who speaks in a tongue edifies themselves, but the one who prophesies edifies the church.

Edifying the church will always be the priority!!

At the risk of being repetitive -

gifts are not for self-indulgence: because it's what I enjoy;

gifts are not for self-expression: because it's important to who I am;

gifts are not for self-promotion: because I am important.

Gifts are from God for the building up of God's Church!

This is obviously a <u>huge</u> issue in the Corinthian church – because God goes on to spend a lot of time on it.

I went through and put what he was saying about tongues on the one hand and prophecy on the other in a table... and I want to briefly show you the highlights so we can see very clearly what God is saying.

Unpacking the gift of tongues

TONGUES PROPHECY

Speaks to God Speaks to people

no one understands ...strengthen, encourage, comfort

builds up themselves builds up the church

great if everyone did but RATHER people prophecy

AIM: to build up the church





Unpacking the gift of tongues

TONGUES

PROPHECY

Tongues on its own - useless instrument - random notes no one knows what is said speaking into the air

it is like we are foreigners

unless with revelation, prophecy or word of instruction

Go for gifts which build up the church



Unpacking the gift of tongues

TONGUES

PROPHECY

pray for interpretation

people cannot say 'amen'

I speak in tongues more than all of you

But would rather speak five intelligible words to instruct others...

...than 10,000 words in a tongue





Unpacking the gift of tongues

TONGUES

Unbelievers – in a church where everyone is speaking in tongues -

..."you're out of your mind"

PROPHECY

Unbelievers – in a church where everyone is prophesying

...convicted of sin

... "God is really among you"





The difference between the two gifts is made incredibly clear... and while there is nothing wrong with speaking in tongues, they will do nothing to build up the church like prophecy will...

Three things I want to say a I close:

Is it your aim - your heart's desire - to use whatever gifts the Lord has given you for the 'common good'... that is, for the **building up of his church** – the **encouragement** and **strengthening** and **comfort** of your brothers and sisters in Christ who are the body of Christ? //

....or is there a chance... that you are seeking to use your gifts not in the service of others, but the service of yourself? //

That's very searching isn't it... it may be hard for you to confront...

And it may mean coming to God in humility and recognising – Oh Lord – I've been making it all about me... I'm so sorry //

Second... there can be NO view here which some church groups claim, whereby unless you speak in tongues you're not the real deal... you cannot come to that conclusion... the Bible says - look - if you have that gift it's between you and God - no one needs to know - and it has no place in the assembly without interpretation... // It can hardly then be essential or a test of whether or not someone is a Christian or has the **Holy Spirit!** And it is so **damaging** and **hurtful** to claim anything **like that!!** //

And the **third** thing I want to leave with you... is **this**....

Let's think about the life our churches... and the nature of our church services...

None of our churches are in danger of being dominated by people speaking in tongues.

But it's a great question to ask – what **DO** unbelievers find when they come to a service at your church?

Maybe I'm being a little controversial here... but I wonder if they would conclude

'these people are out of their mind'

OR

'God is really among you'?? //

Now don't get me wrong – I do think the church service is mainly for the believer... so that they might praise God and hear his word...

...but sometimes – like those who speak in tongues – we can sometimes so inward focused... so indulgent about how we do things... that we can consider nothing about the impact for unbelievers when they come... //

Wouldn't it be great if what they experienced and observed among was so real – so powerful – so engaging and compelling... so intelligible... that people were convicted of their sin and concluded 'God is really among you!'

I sometimes think that what we do and say and sing is so	alien to the unbeliever, that	we might as well be
speaking in tongues		

My brothers and sisters – over these past weeks – what a vision for the church we've seen!
People – you and me – gifted in different ways – but all working together in love //
Friends, eagerly desire gifts of the Spirit – especially those which build up Christ's body
so that our churches may strong, faithful, alive
Where the love of God is palpable !
Where we are all growing stronger in our love for God
more devoted to Jesus
More clear about God's word
more passionate about the good news //
to what great end? //
so that when those who do not yet believe come among us their hearts are laid open by the power of the Word of God and they exclaim "God is really among you! "
