- My mum didn't like the Old Testament.
- Too much fighting and killing, she would say.
- Perhaps **you've** felt that way too.
- Or perhaps you've known many of the Old Testament stories from Sunday School or school scripture, but never really understood how they all fit **together** or even had a notion that they DO to **together**!
- And let's face it, when it comes to the Old Testament reading in church many of us don't have a **clue** as to the historical context of the passage... the time frame... the nature of the literature... and often they are just words being read which we don't connect with at all.
- True? //
- But listen to these words in Luke 24.
- This is after Jesus' resurrection and he's talking to the two disciples on the road to Emmaus... and Luke says, "And beginning with Moses and all the Prophets, he explained to them what was said in all the Scriptures concerning himself.
- The scriptures Jesus' refers to are of course our Old Testament ...
- He explained to them what was said in the Scriptures, concerning himself!
- Then later in the same chapter, from Jesus' own lips this time v44, ""This is what I told you while I was still with you: Everything must be fulfilled that is written about <u>me</u> in the Law of Moses, the Prophets and the Psalms."" our Old Testament!
- So I want to say to mum mum it's way more than fighting and killing... Jesus said 'it's all about me'...
- I want us **ALL** to see **that**!
- And I hope this series which I've called "All about Jesus", will help us all understand the wonderful, profound significance of the Old Testament.
- For these Scriptures are **OUR** Scriptures!
- Paul says in 2 Timothy 3:16-17 **ALL** Scripture is God-breathed and is useful for teaching, rebuking, correcting and training in righteousness, ¹⁷ so that the servant of God may be thoroughly equipped for every good work.
- At the time Paul only **had** what we call the Old Testament as his Scriptures.
- They were the Scriptures!

- And they are **ALL God-breathed** they come **FROM** God; **FOR** us and they will **equip** us for **living** for **God**!
- So here is what we going to see in this 9-week series:

Series intro

- 1. From Genesis Creation fall flood one nation Egypt
- 2. From Exodus Out of Egypt Israel rescued and commissioned
- 3. From **Leviticus to Deuteronomy** The giving of the law outlining our response to grace so that God's people devoted and distinctive
- 4. Joshua to Judges Heading into the Promised land which turned out to be a tragic disaster
- 5. From **1 Samuel through to 2 Kings** 'Give us a King' the people asked thereby sacking God. Kingship didn't work out so well and God's people ended up banished from the promised land
- 6. **Some of the smaller books of the prophets** God promised a return to the land but it didn't live up to ideals and we are left waiting waiting for Jesus...
- 7. **Psalms** the songs of God's people
- 8. Wisdom literature wisdom for God's people
- 9. Weird and wonderful assurance for God's people in the books we call apocalyptic literature
- So my prayer is that by the end of the series you'll have a better sense of the significance of the Old Testament; understand how it points us to Jesus AND have your appetite whetted to know more and delve deeper. //
- And so we begin with **Genesis**.... In the beginning.
- The book of Genesis sets everything up for us...
- ...the whole story of God's relationship to humankind; starts here...
- So I want to explore with you today, four significant movements we see in Genesis...

Four movements:

- 1. From delight to grief
- 2. From judgement to mercy
- 3. From chaos to order
- 4. From Canaan to Egypt
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- First
- 1. FROM DELIGHT TO GRIEF
- What am I talking about?
- Have a look with me at the end of Genesis 1... God had finished creating everything... and let me say in passing precisely **HOW** that happened is not the focus the **WHO** and the **WHY** are the focus that God created **everything**... for **US** and for his **GLORY**... //
- ...and v31 proclaims God saw all that he had made, and it was very good
- The creation with humankind at the centre was VERY GOOD!!

- God **delighted** in his creation...
- It was **perfect** in every way.
- Perfect relationship between **God** and **humankind**
- Perfect relationships **between** humans
- Perfect relationship with creation...
- BUT
- By the time we get to **chapter 6** v6 we read *The Lord* **regretted** that he had made human beings on the earth, and his heart was deeply troubled.
- Why? From delight to grief!!
- Verse 5 The Lord saw how great the wickedness of the human race had become on the earth, and that every inclination of the thoughts of the human heart was **only evil all the time**.
- Well that didn't take long for everything to go pear-shaped... did it!? /
- What happened?
- **Genesis 3** happened.
- Adam and Eve **mistrusted God**... didn't believe he was **FOR** them... they believed the **lies** of the Evil One went out on their **own**... and decided to live life their **own** way, rejecting **God** as **God** and putting **themselves** in **charge**.
- And God's heart is **broken**.
- It grieved him to his heart.
- The depths of humanity's **sinfulness** brings great **sorrow** to God...
- He is **perfect** and **just**... and deeply **affected** by the evil which now marks the hearts of **humankind**.
- Ephesians 4:30 Do not grieve the Holy Spirit of God, with whom you were sealed for the day of redemption.
- Your sin today, has grieved God's heart.
- Every moment where you pushed God aside and have done things your own way.
- If you are a parent, think about how your heart is impacted when a child young or old goes against your will...
- And when sin came into the world every relationship was mucked up: ours with God; our relationships with one another and our relationship with creation. //
- And what we discover here is that there is only one solution... the solution provided by God himself
- for what we see in Genesis is that from the moment Adam and Eve choose to go it alone... God is planning our **restoration**...
- the only way to deal with the mess sin created is the death and resurrection of the Lord Jesus....
- For God **so loved** the **world**, that he **gave** his **only Son**...! //
- From **delight** to **grief** the **first movement**.
- the second I want to trace with you is

2. FROM JUDGEMENT TO MERCY

- We are not surprised by hearing of the judgement of God when Adam and Eve do their own thing
- Rebellion has consequences.
- God cannot ignore or turn a blind eye or say, 'ah don't worry about it'.
- So Adam will experience work as difficult
- Eve will have pain in **childbirth**...
- The serpent is **condemned** to being on his **belly**... //
- But what might surprise you is the **mercy** of God to Adam and Eve
- And this sets up a pattern throughout all the Scriptures... that whenever God acts in **judgment** there is always **mercy**...
- What do we say in that beautiful Anglican prayer? "We are not worthy so much as to gather up the crumbs under your **table**. But you are the same Lord whose nature is always to have **mercy**."
- <u>Whose nature is always to have mercy</u>....! //
- So even in the garden after their rebellion; in his **mercy**, God provides **clothes** for **Adam** and **Eve**...
- Even **banishing** them from the garden of Eden is an act of <u>mercy</u>... in that God **prevents access** to the tree of **life**, so they may not **forever continue** in their state of **rebellion**.
- In his **mercy**, God promised that the serpent would not have the last word... but in Genesis 3:15 said that future **offspring** of the **woman** would one day **crush** the serpent's **head**...
- I never used to understand this as a kid but this is a wonderful picture which points to the future victory of Jesus (the eventual offspring of Eve), over the evil one (pictured here as the serpent) at the cross and the resurrection! Staggering!
- The serpent has been very vocal in Genesis 3 but he will not have the last word... Jesus will crush him in the end.
- There is <u>mercy</u> seen again at the **flood**... as sobering as that account is... in **mercy**, God provided salvation to Noah and his family in the ark...
- Even though in ch 6 God had determined to **undo** his **ENTIRE** creation... he extended his **grace** and **mercy** to **Noah**. ///
- Can you see how this points us forward to God's provision for US in JESUS?
- As Noah and his family were safe through the coming Judgement in the ARK...
- So WE are safe through the coming judgement if we are <u>in JESUS</u> in relationship with Jesus trusting Jesus! ///
- And **finally** in the **Joseph** story do you recall Abraham's son with a multi-coloured coat sold into slavery by his jealous brothers...?
- Though they deserved judgement... God through Joseph extends God's mercy to his brothers when they discovered that the Prime Minister overseeing Egypt in the face of famine was none other than their long-lost brother...
- Joseph forgives them... in tears and is reconciled to them...
- It's a beautiful picture of God's mercy, forgiveness and reconciliation ... ///

- Have you experienced the **riches** of God's **mercy**?
- Been touched by his love and forgiveness and the promise of restoration?
- Are you safe in Jesus from the coming judgment just as Noah and his family were safe in the ark? //
- That is what the good news of Jesus is all about! ///
- And we are beginning to learn about it right here in the very first book of the **Bible**!
- Well more briefly now... the movement in Genesis...:

3. FROM CHAOS TO ORDER

- The **chaos** in the world caused by human **rebellion** is addressed by God's **mercy** in the provision of the **ark**.
- As a result as God provides that salvation there is an order a calm after the flood as Noah and his family set about to repopulate the world...
- There is a movement from chaos to order as God chooses **Abraham** from all the people of the world **through** whom he will be at work to **bless** all the **peoples** of the **world**...
- So let me remind you in Genesis 12 Abraham is singled out...
- ...God promises to make him into a great nation... and make him a blessing. ///
- WHY will God's purposes now focus on ONE man and ONE nation the nation of Israel?
- So that Genesis 12:3 through that man and the nation which will come from him <u>all peoples on</u> <u>earth will be blessed! //</u>
- From chaos to order! //
- And finally the move from chaos to order is seen in the Joseph account as the chaos of the famine in Egypt and across the world – is brought into order by God's appointed saviour in the famine – Joseph.
- And Joseph and his saving work is a shadow a sign an anticipation of that greater Saviour Jesus... ///
- And these movements in the book of Genesis from **chaos** to **order** point us to the **ultimate ORDER** which Jesus **brings**.
- Jesus' salvation will bring the <u>ultimate</u> order from the chaos of sin
- Jesus is the final fulfilment of God's promises to Abraham HE is the means by which all nations will be blessed
- Jesus is the **ultimate Saviour** not from **death** by **famine** but from **death** by **sin**! //
- This is the case in **your** life and **mine**!
- For many of us life was a mess or chaos before Jesus but Jesus has brought order to our lives... purpose, direction, hope, joy... and the ultimate order of forgiveness and reconciliation
- And what we know now in part the order we now have a glimpse of we will one day know completely – when ultimate order is brought – by Jesus – when he returns – and ushers in the new creation.
- Well finally the movement in Genesis...

4. FROM CANAAN TO EGYPT

- This will set us up for next week...
- But the end of the book of Genesis... sees God's people having moved from the **Promised Land** to **Egypt** for **survival**.
- Joseph son of Isaac descended of Abraham was running Egypt. He was put in charge of first **preserving provisions** then **making** provisions **available** throughout the very serious famine....
- So we reach the end of the book and we wonder what is the future for God's people...?
- They've been saved from the famine but they are a small group of 70 people what has happened to God's promises to Abraham that from him will come a great nation?
- How come they are no longer in the land of **Canaan** God first gave to **Abraham**? //
- And you'll have to come back next week to find the **answers**... and to see just how significant is the book of **Exodus** for understanding that our God is a God who **saves** and **rescues** his **people**...!
- //
- Let me close...
- Has the Old Testament been pretty much a closed book for you until now?
- Confusing... hard to read hard to connect with hard to make sense of how it helps us in our Christian lives?
- I hope what we've looked at today has given you just a **glimpse** into its significance and whetted your appetite to want to know **more**...
- For we see pictured here for us...
- God's grief at our rebellion AND
- His mercy even in the face of judgement
- That grief and that mercy ultimately leads to the gift of Jesus his **Son**, by whose death and resurrection comes **order** from the **chaos**... the order of reconciliation and restoration from the chaos of our sin and rebellion.
- Praise God!
