Title: Disaster in the promised land

God's **people**, in God's **place**, enjoying God's **presence**.

That's where the Bible begins // with the account of Adam and Eve

....It's also where the Bible ends

Remember? Rev 21:3 - God's dwelling place is now among the people, and he will dwell with them. They will be his people, and God himself will be with them and be their God.

God's people, in God's place, enjoying God's presence

The whole sweep of the Bible story is of God's grace at work to restore what was lost when Adam and Eve decided to do their own thing

Through **Abraham** he established a people – the nation of Israel

In **Exodus** we saw God's great rescue plan – to bring his people out the cruel slavery of the Egyptians by his power and grace... by the death of a lamb in place of the first born of Israel and his opening and closing of the Red Sea...

And He commissions them as his treasured possession – his holy nation.

He promises them a place – the promised land

He promises to be with them - as symbolised by his presence in the tabernacle and the temple ////

BUT.... they blew it...!

They made a calf of gold and bowed down and worshipped it

And then just as they were on the verge of entering the promised land – they couldn't trust that God was sufficiently powerful to put the land he had promised, into their **hands**...

...and so they **forfeited** the blessing of the land... and an entire generation had to wait it out in the desert for 40 years! //

Today as we all too briefly explore Joshua and Judges...

Moses is dead

They have a **new leader** in the person of **Joshua**

And God is preparing his people once *more* to enter into the land he had promised. ///

But here's the question – will they **DO** it this **time**?

Will they cross the Jordan and take the **land**?

Will they take the land as they'd been instructed?

Will they keep their **eyes** on **God**?

Will they trust He is **present** with them? //

So – here is where we are heading:

First

1. CONQUERING THE PROMISED LAND

Joshua 1 v2 Moses my servant is dead. Now then, you and all these people, get ready to cross the Jordan River into the land I am about to give them – to the Israelites. I will give you every place where you set your foot, as I promised Moses. Your territory will extend from the desert to the Lebanon and from the great river, the Euphrates – and all the Hittite country – to the Great Sea on the west.

The command? GO!

Get ready to cross the Jordan into the land

Now let's think about this: - this would be no small feat!

We're probably talking around 2 million people!

Crossing a river which in flood in the spring was over a kilometre wide!

And remember, there were the people **already** living in the land!

It wasn't vacant uninhabited territory...

this must have been an overwhelming prospect for Joshua...

But here's the **promise**:

v5 – no one will be able to stand up against you all the days of your life. As I was with Moses, so I will be with you; I will never leave you or forsake you.

God didn't commission Joshua to do anything he wasn't going to enable him to do

And the promise is two-fold

- (a) That Joshua will be protected no one will be able to stand up against him; and
- (b) That Joshua will never be alone God will be with him and never leave or forsake him

Great promises from God to Joshua

Promises in which he can have **confidence** and from which he can draw **strength**. ///

Now – we're not to just lift this command and promise to Joshua and apply it to our own context... //

But we have commands and promises given to us from which to draw similar confidence and strength

Because – WE are told to go and make disciples – AND promised Jesus will be with us to the end of the age.

A command and a promise

Go – and I will be with you!

We are not sent to do anything by ourselves or in our strength

God always is **consistent**... - he never **changes** or **fails us**... //

Trust that in whatever he's **called** you to **do** – he will be **with** you... ///

Now – as Israel enter the promised land... you will have noticed – they were to drive out all the inhabitants of the land...

Not only to drive them out, but to kill and destroy...

And that surely raises some questions we need to explore; so:

2. WHAT!?

- Back in Deuteronomy 7: God said to Israel: destroy them totally. Make no treaty with them and show them no mercy. ³ Do not intermarry with them. Do not give your daughters to their sons or take their daughters for your sons, 4 for they will turn your children away from following me to serve other gods For you are a people holy to the LORD your God.
- Now to our western 21st century ears, this sounds outrageous!
- How dare God put these people out of their land! //
- But friends, this was God's appropriate judgement on these peoples for despicable behaviour and for their crude religious practices which included child sacrifice, degrading sexual immorality...
- Think the TALIBAN and multiply by quite a few factors!! Terrible dark days... appalling times...!//
- We typically cry out today for God to do something... "Lord please stop those terrorists from gunning down people and slitting priests' throats and setting off their suicide bombs..." "Please stop the abuse of children..." "God – why don't you do something!!" we say...!
- At THIS point in history... God DID do something... to stop the abuses the evil of the time... to stop

idol worship and child sacrifice... and Israel was an instrument in God's hand, of his appropriate judgement. //

- the reason they were to be **completely** wiped out?
- So that they would not be there to influence God's people.
- They were **enemies** of God and of his people... their ongoing influence would be a **disaster**... //// (indeed.... As it turned out to be!!!!)
- Can you imagine a surgeon cutting out just **some** of the cancer from a patient and saying we'll I'm just going to leave some there because those cancer cells have just as much right to live as all the other cells in the body...!!?? ///
- Absurd and dangerous...! Deadly in fact! //
- So they were to **rid** the land of these evil people... **ENTIRELY**!! ///
- But Israel had other plans Israel's catch cry is

3. I DID IT MY WAY

- Like a toddler trying to take over from its parents "I want to do it..."
- So the book of Joshua is one of conquering the promised land, but not as God had clearly set out...
- and Judges outlines the failure: ch 1 v21 the Benjamites failed to dislodge the Jebusites, v27 Manasseh did not drive out the people of Beth Shan...
 - v29 Ephriam did not drive out the Canaanites...
 - v30 neither did **Zebulun** drive out the **Cannaanites**...
 - v31 nor did Asher drive out those living in Acco... etc etc you're getting the picture! /
- Just before Joshua died, he challenged Israel "chose this day whom you will serve the God who brought you out of **Egypt**, or the **gods** of the **nations**." (Josh 24:15)
- They had made a solemn pledge: "we WILL serve the Lord!" //
- But **NOW** they ended up their own thing... and because they failed to drive the people from the land... what do we read???
- Have a look with me at Ch 2 v11 Then the Israelites did evil in the eyes of the Lord and served the Baals. They forsook the Lord, the God of their fathers, who had brought them out of Egypt. They followed and worshipped various gods of the people around them... //
- Called to be uncompromising... they compromised
- Called to stand **out**, they wanted to **blend in!**
- They claimed they would obey... they disobeyed...
- They looked for **easier** ways to serve God than he had **commanded**.
- Their promised loyalty, was gone ////
- Of course, this still happens among God's people. ///
- I see it in my **own life //**
- I'm called to be uncompromising... I compromise
- I'm called to stand out... and I want to blend in

- I'm called to a life of **obedience**... I **disobey**.
- I look for **easier** ways to serve God than he **commands**.
- I do it my way! ///
- And **YOU**? ///
- How could they when God in his great mercy and awesome power had rescued them from Egypt to bring them to the **promised Land**? ///
- How could I when God in his great mercy and awesome power has rescued me from sin and death by the death and resurrection of the Lord Jesus... and brought me into his family as one of his? /////
- And that is why I want to share with you....

4. THE ASTONISHING LOVE OF GOD

- God doesn't give **up** on his people...
- God is **jealous** for **OUR undivided love!**
- You forsake him and he will do whatever it takes to pursue you...
- ...even if that means for a time... you suffer the consequences of your sin... until such times as you wake up and call on him...
- And this is what we see **time and time again** in **Judges**.
- Israel **sinned** following the Canaanite gods and practices...
- God allows Israel to be conquered and oppressed by the Canaanites.... as his appropriate judgement on them
- Israel would see the error of their ways and repent and cry out to God for help...
- God would raise up a judge (or deliverer or saviour) to defeat the enemy and a time of peace would break out ///
- Those Judges include Othniel, Ehud, Deborah, Gideon, and perhaps the most famous Samson.
- But each time these Judges rescued Israel, eventually Israel would sin again and the cycle of rebellion would start over. ///
- I want to zoom in and explore just one example of this cycle the story of Ehud the second Judge of the book... Glance with me at Judges 3:12-30

In v12 – ... Othniel – the first judge had just died... Again the Israelites did evil in the eyes of the Lord, and because they did this evil the Lord gave Eglon king of Moab power over Israel.

- v14 tells us they were subject to him for 18 years!
- v15 Eventually they cried out to the Lord...
- And he gave them a deliverer a saviour... Ehud...
- Ehud was left-handed....
- He sought a private meeting with Eglon... told him he had a secret message for him...
- As he drew close to the King; with his left hand, he drew the sword from his right thigh, and drove it into

Eglon's belly. Ehud died there and then. ///

- **GOD** is the hero of the story...
- THEY CALLED OUT TO GOD
- **GOD RAISED UP EHOUD FOR THEM....**
- God's people are **rescued** and **saved once more!**
- God in his love moves to save his people in their afflictions...
- ...even those afflictions which he himself brought upon his people because of their rebellion against him! ///
- Don't some of us need to hear this this morning? that in our troubles.... Whether the result of our sins or not – we have a God who doesn't change.... STILL a compassionate God who hears our cries for help and comes to save us in our distress?
- Such is the astonishing love of God! /// even in the face of repeated rebellion! ///
- The deliverers God sent in the time of the Judges were frail human beings... flawed...
- They could only rescue for a **time**... and the cycle **began** again
- What Judges begs for.... Is a perfect judge, a perfect s Saviour!
- who could come and BREAK the cycle... and bring lasting peace with God... //
- ...which God does in sending a deliverer a saviour the Lord Jesus Christ himself...
- And this Saviour didn't KILL to save...
- ...he **DIED** to **save**... ///
- And if you call on him today... or have called on him in the past then the restoration and peace you have, will know no end!! ///

Let me close...

- The book of **Judges** finishes in **chaos**.
- The final chapters are punctuated by a **repeated phrase** so we get the **point**
- Can I show you?
- 17:6 In those days Israel had no **king**; everyone did as they saw fit
- 18:1 In those days Israel had no king
- 19:1 In those days Israel had no king
- 21:5 the very last verse of the book In those days Israel had no king; everyone did as they saw fit.
- You can't miss the point....
- No leadership... a complete and utter leadership vacuum... no moral compass whatsoever... total chaos was the result...
- The utter **confusion** of a **depraved people**.
- Image-making
- **Idol-worship**

- Mixing of religions a little bit of this a little bit of that
- Sexual appetites totally unchecked resulting in the most abhorrent abuse imaginable.
- Gang rape, sodomy, murder...
- Everyone did as they saw fit. //
- It's a depressing end to the book... but it sets the scene for 1 and 2 Samuel and 1 and 2 Kings which we'll look at next week.... ///
- You know.... there was so much hope and potential as they prepared to cross the Jordan and enter the promised land!
- But now what?
- And what is here for us?
- We know we have a better saviour than Joshua!!
- ...a better judge then all of these judges put together...
- His name is Jesus... God saves...!!!
- And looking at these two books just shows us all the more the great NEED that there was, for our Saviour Jesus!
- And now /we put our hope and trust in him!
- And we long for that day of his return, when the temporary saving we see here will be permanent and a repeat of the cycle of rebellion, will never happen again...
- And we respond with awe and wonder at the God who saves!
