Introduction

- Have you ever wanted something so **badly**, that it consumed all your **time** and came to totally dominate your thinking...?
- ... something that went against the advice of others but you didn't care... you knew better... //
- ...and then when you finally took hold of it, it was great at first, but as time you went on, you realised that all it had cost you along the way, and in fact all that it meant in the present... wasn't really worth it?
- like Fred (not his real name)... who liked fast cars... and after much saving went and bought his dream car and often went drag racing in the early morning hours... until one morning there was a terrible sound of shattering glass and twisting steel and a couple of mates lost their lives and he became a paraplegic...
- He **got** what we **wanted** but he **lost** what he **had**.
- He got his car. Had his fun. But lost a sound body, his independence and some mates.
- Then there was a Mary (not her real name) whose parents were quite strict and reacted badly to her nose stud and all her ear piercing and what she wore... and after yet another nasty argument with her parents decided she wanted out. She took off in the middle of the night... and found her way to Kings Cross where she was taken in by the nicest of people who showed her how to make a living and support herself... and there she entered a downhill spiral of prostitution and drugs...
- She **got** what she **wanted**, but she **lost** what she **had**.
- She was free from her parents, but she lost her dignity, her innocence, her health, her opportunities... //
- Let me ask you this: does God let us go our own way even if it is going to hurt us?

- That is a **little something** of what we'll explore today
- Today we tackle four great books... 1 and 2 Samuel and 1 and 2 Kings... but the way we are going to do it is by looking at 1 Samuel 8...
 - ...because as Israel asks for a king in this chapter, we gain insight into the how and why of the catastrophic failure of Kingship for Israel.
- Now you'll recall that Judges where we finished last week ended with that dramatic verse Judges 21:25 - In those days Israel had no king; everyone did as they saw fit.
- I want to begin today, simply by asking:
- 1) WHAT IS THIS PASSAGE ABOUT?

a. Samuel's age and Samuel's sons

- as chapter 8 opens, we read that the prophet Samuel whom God miraculously raised up following the period of the Judges, is getting old.
- he wants a succession plan in place for the leadership of Israel and appoints his two boys Joel and Abijah as judges.
- But 8:3 his sons did not walk in his ways. They turned aside after dishonest gain and accepted bribes and perverted justice.

b. We want a King!

- So the **elders** of Israel gathered together and said quite **bluntly** (8:5) you are old, and your sons do not walk in your ways; now appoint a king to lead us, such as all the other nations have.
- Well not surprisingly, Samuel was hurt.
- He took it as a rejection of him, certainly a rejection of his sons, and a rejection of the model God had given them for the leadership of Israel.
- However, if Samuel was hurt than God was even more so... he said to Samuel (8:7): 'Listen to all that the people are saying to you; it is not **you** they have rejected, but they have rejected **me** as their king... which (by the way) they have been doing since I brought them up out of Egypt!
- And the **Lord** said to **Samuel**: 'Tell them then what having a King will be like!'

c. You don't want a King!

- So Samuel went back to them and said 'you don't want a king!'
- (8:11ff) He'll take your sons and some he will send into battle, some he will use to farm his land; and others he'll use to make his weapons and chariots...
- He'll take your daughters and force them to be perfumers and cooks and bakers...
- He will take your fields and vineyards and olive trees and give them to his attendants.
- He will take your servants and your cattle and your donkeys and use them for himself.
- He will take a **tenth** of your **flocks** and **you** you will become his **slaves**.
- And when that day comes, and you cry out to the Lord for relief from the King you have chosen... THE LORD WILL NOT ANSWER YOU! //
- Believe me you don't want a King! //

d. Yes we do!

- Yes we do! We do want a king over us! •
- Then we will be like all the other nations with a King to lead us and to go out before us and fight our battles! ////
- And you know what the Lord said? //
- Give them a King. //
- Give them a King. //
- And so they got what they wanted... but they lost what they had...

WHAT DOES IT TEACH US ABOUT GOD? 2)

- It was a sobering moment wasn't it when God said they have rejected me as their King! as they have done from the day I brought them up out of Egypt!
- But it clearly shows that >>>
 - a. Given half a chance, we'll reject God as King
- Wasn't that the issue with Adam and Eve...? not submitting to God's rule over them?
- Wasn't that the issue throughout the entire history of Israel which led to their banishment from the promised land?
- Jesus tells a parable in Luke 19... a noble man goes off to be appointed King and the people send a delegation after him saying - 'we don't want this man to be our King...' Jesus was referring to himself in that parable!
- given half a chance, we'll not only reject God as King, but string him up on a cross! //
- But the most common way God is rejected as King today?
- Apathy, distraction, neglect... replaced with that very impressive gods of me, myself and me!
- Given half a chance, we'll reject God as King!; and >>>
 - b. Given half a chance, we want to be like everyone else
- it's another sobering moment in this passage (8:19): we want a king over us; then we will be like all the other nations!
- The very thing they were called **not to be!**
- You will remember the commission God gave them in Exodus 19:5 'if you obey me fully and keep my covenant, then out of all nations you will be my treasured possession. Although the whole earth is mine, 6 you will be for me a kingdom of priests and a holy nation.'
- they were to stand out... they were meant to show the brilliance of being in relationship with God.
- And the fact that they didn't have a king like all the other nations was meant to show their uniqueness as a nation – and that God was their King and the only King they needed! //
- But **now now** they want to be like **all the other nations**.
- They wanted to abandon their unique role in the world. They didn't want to stand out any more. //

- Israel wanted to walk away from their distinct role... "we want to be like everyone else". ///
- And sometimes I want that too!
- I don't want to be different any more. Its too exhausting. I just want to be like everyone else. // AND YOU?? //
- But here is the last point about what this passage teaches us about God >>>
 - c. Sometimes God gives us what we want!
- 8:21-22 When Samuel heard all that the people said, he repeated it before the LORD. 22 The LORD answered, "Listen to them and give them a king."
- Why did he do that? Was it resignation?
- Was it to shut them up?
- Or was it judgement?
- He gave them what they wanted.
- They asked for a King. He told them through Samuel that they wouldn't like what a King would bring. They refused to listen and persisted in their request. So he gave them a king.
- and did you notice the sobering v18? when that day comes, you will cry out for relief from the king you have chosen, and the Lord will not answer you in that day...
- that wasn't the last word from the Lord to Israel... but it is a stern warning that when we go our own way we may just reap the consequences...
- And you know what? Subsequent kings WERE everything Samuel warned they would be.
- Saul was good for a little while, David and Solomon had their high moments but with a few exceptions, it was all downhill from there!
- Following Solomon, there was sharp disagreement about who should follow him, that the kingdom divided into the northern Kingdom, which was known as Israel and the Southern Kingdom known as Judah. (And on the back of the discussion questions this week, I've included those who were kings of the north and kings of the south).
- But the rebellion in both the north and souths resulted in the collapse of both Kingdoms.
- the Northern Kingdom fell to the Assyrian Empire in 722 B.C
- and the Southern Kingdom finally fell to the Babylonians following an 18 month siege of Jerusalem in 586 B.C.
- their kings didn't listen to God, nor to his prophets. They mixed their religions with the nations round about. They set up false altars to false gods. They led people away from the Lord – and so eventually - out of the promised land and into captivity.
- ISRAEL GOT WHAT THEY WANTED, BUT THEY LOST WHAT THEY HAD! //
- They **lost** their **unique relationship** with **God** as their **only King**.
- They forfeited their unique role in the world. They lost their temple. They lost their city. They lost the **presence** of the **Lord**. They **lost** his **protection**.
- **BUT THEY GOT THEIR KING!**

- And **sometimes sometimes** God just **gives** us what we **want**.
- Adam and Eve wanted the knowledge of good and evil.
- They got what they wanted, but they lost what they had.
- They lost their innocence. Lost their garden. Lost their intimacy both with God and with one another. //
- The prodigal son got his part of the inheritance he so desperately wanted so that he could get away... but he spent all the money and the friends who he thought were friends deserted him and he wound up eating husks in a pig pen.
- HE GOT WHAT HE WANTED, BUT HE LOST WHAT HE HAD. //
- SOMETIMES, GOD GIVES US WHAT WE WANT.
- And we are left to **deal** with the **consequences** of our **foolishness** or our **disobedience**.
- ▶In the words of Paul (Rom 1:21) although they knew God, they neither glorified him as God nor gave thanks to him, 24 therefore God gave them over in the sinful desires of their hearts... 28 he gave them over to a depraved mind to do what ought not to be done...
- YES, SOMETIMES, GOD GIVES US WHAT WE WANT.
- AND WE GET WHAT WE WANTED, BUT WE LOSE WHAT WE HAD.
- Like the man for whom his career was everything. He longed for this new dream position. He got it..... But it got him in the end. His family suffered. His marriage ended. He hardly saw his children. He became desperately unhappy.
- HE GOT WHAT HE WANTED BUT HE LOST WHAT HE HAD.
- Or the woman who set her heart on the man she wanted even though both she and he were married to other people. They had a dream weekend together, but were found out. She became pregnant to him. Both marriages, both families were destroyed.
- SHE GOT WHAT SHE WANTED, BUT SHE LOST WHAT SHE HAD.
- Brothers and sisters in Christ... is there anything in your life you are pursuing at present that you know isn't right? You know it's not God's will – not his best for you?
- It may be merely **unwise**, or it may be something **disobedient**.
- DON'T PURSUE IT ANY FURTHER!
- God may just give what you want and leave you with the consequences.
- YOU MAY GET WHAT YOU WANT... BUT LOSE WHAT YOU HAVE! //
- 3) How does it point us to Jesus?
- And this is really very **simple** but **profound**.
 - **₱Jesus THE King!**
- For it reminds us of the ultimate King. The one completely unlike the king, Samuel described.
- The perfect King. The one in the line of King David.
- Jesus is that King.

- The opposite to the King the people wanted. The one who came not be served but to serve. The king who instead of **taking** from his people actually gave his **life** for them in their **service**.
- The king who by that death, atones for all our stupid failures of the past and forgives our sin and puts our lives back together when we've mucked up...
- And the one who God has now exalted to the highest place and given the name above every name that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow and in heaven and on earth and under the earth and every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord to the glory of God the Father.
