# 4 Is your faith dead?

- 1. **Dead faith illustrated** vv14-16
- 2. True trust explained vv17-19
- 3. True trust illustrated vv20-16

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- Last week my opening line was: "If your relationship with Jesus is genuine, it cannot help but make a difference in your life."
- Let me go one step further... if there is no **outward evidence** of a **real** relationship with God in your life... then its highly likely there **isn't** a real relationship with God. //
- Or as James says a little more bluntly faith without works //
  is dead.
- James started on this theme back in chapter 1 do you recall?
- Religion that God our Father accepts as pure and faultless is this: to look after the orphans and widows in their distress and, to keep oneself from being polluted by the world.
- Religion true relationship with God WILL show itself by mirroring God's care and action for the poor. AND taking a

stand against all the rubbish on our media that pollutes our minds!

- Then in last week's passage, James says have a good look at yourselves – what you're actually doing is paying more attention to the rich and ignoring the poor.
- Even in your assemblies you show the rich the best seats and have the poor stand at the back!
- <u>God</u> has demonstrated his love and action for the poor
- You have demonstrated your love and action for the rich!
- So what good is your claim to faith?
- It's just a claim. It has no reality.
- And a claim to have faith which has no reality, cannot, will not, save you.
- It has to be a question worth asking this morning doesn't it?
- Is it possible that my claim to have faith is just that?
- A <u>claim</u> not based in <u>reality</u>?
- A claim, without any evidence?
- That would be a terrible thought...
- So let's see what James says and see if we can work out where we stand...
- Let's look firstly at:

#### 1. Dead faith illustrated (vv 14-16)

- Have you seen that show 'hypothetical' with Geoffrey Robinson?
- Where different hypothetical situations are put before a panel of experts of various kinds to see what they would do in the situation?
- James has a hypothetical for us.
- v15 Suppose a brother or sister is without clothes and daily food. If one you says to him, "Go, I wish you well; keep warm and well fed," but does nothing about his physical needs, what good is it?.
- A man rang the church phone in Noosa a few years back.
- He had moved in to the area, was staying in the caravan park
  waiting for a rental house he had lined up to become
  available. He had a couple of teenagers and because he'd had
  to pay a bond on the house and then a lot of money for the
  caravan park, they had no food until centre link payment in a
  couple of days.
- Can you imagine if I'd said to him 'well, sorry to hear about your situation; I hope everything works out OK for you and your family – good luck'? and then hung up the phone.
- Sad!! and useless.
- But you know what? it's not far from the reality of what I
  had done on some previous occasions...

- At Roseville we were on the train line... and up and down the North Shore of Sydney there are a quite a few churches close to the railway line.
- So homeless people used to ride the train lines and stop off at the Rectories (ministers' residences) along the way.
- How do you help some of those people?
- Some of them pushed my patience when they came to the door with a lighted cigarette in hand, smelling of alcohol.
- Some of them I dismissed pretty smartly out of a mixed sense of despair – not knowing what to do – annoyance – they always called at the worst of times – and helplessness – what I do to really help anyway?
- I am certain in some cases I could have done more than what
   I did!
- So what good is it, if I simply say 'peace be with you' but do nothing to ensure that person has any physical comfort? //
- If that's the best my faith can lead me to do, says James, it is dead. It is not faith. It is not real.

#### 2. True trust explained (vv 17-19)

 James' point is simple – let's have a look: - v17 In the same way, faith by itself, if it is not accompanied by action, is dead

- Faith by itself that does nothing for the needy and poor and homeless and addicted other than wish them well as they go on their way – is dead.
- Dead.
- Not sick
- Not struggling.
- But dead. //
- Are you sure James? //
- We have to be clear about how he's using the word 'faith' here.
- It's a *claim* to faith he says.
- It's a *claim* to believe something is true... but doesn't act on the truth at all.
- It's not true faith. ///
- You see, you actually can't separate **faith** and **deeds**; or **faith** and the outward **expression** of faith.
- So in this hypothetical panel James is running someone says
   (v18) 'you have faith, I have deeds'...
- You know as if the church needs all types some people have faith – and some people who those who just get on and do stuff.
- But James is saying <u>no!</u> you can't separate them.

- They belong **together**. Faith and deeds are **inseparable**.
- So he challenges 'show me your faith without deeds'...
- And of course how can you?
- The only way you can **demonstrate** true **faith** real **trust** is as that trust is being **expressed**.
- Famous tightrope walker Blondin. Niagara falls. "We believe in you Blondin." "OK – so who will jump in the wheel barrow!?" //
- "You believe there is one God..." says James picking up on the foundation of Jewish faith...
- Good... but so what...?
- Even the demons believe there is one God at least they shudder at the thought!
- Real relationship you see true trust will make a difference...
- So he gives us finally, two illustrations of what true trust looks like:

#### 3. True trust illustrated (vv20-26)

- The first one comes right out of Genesis 22 and would have been a story his first readers knew backwards.
- It's the story of the radical demand for Abraham to sacrifice his only son.

- A son much promised and long waited.
- But implicit trust in both the character and purposes of the God he knew and loved, meant that Abraham's trust resulted in obedience
- His faith was 'made complete' that is revealed to be a true faith a real trust by this amazing act of devotion.
- (if you're not familiar with the story let me assure you that Abraham was not required to go through with such a shocking thing – but God stopped him and provided a lamb for sacrifice in the boy's place – an early sign way back in Genesis of God providing the lamb of God – his Son – to take away the sins of the world!)
- But as a result of Abraham's obedience which sprang from
  his trust, the saying in Genesis 15 'Abraham believed God' –
  trusted God 'and it was credited to him as righteousness' was
  fulfilled demonstrated as being true.
- That is, his faith had brought him into a right relationship with God.
- So to believe God, is a commitment to action.
- If it's **real**, a real trust, a real belief, a real faith you'll **see** it.
- So James gives us a summary statement in v24: You see that a person is justified by what he **does** and not by faith **alone**...
- What James means is that true faith real trust can never exist by itself.

- He's not saying anything in contrast to the Apostle Paul when he says that it is only by grace we can be saved.
- He's saying yes it is of course, grace that saves us but the faith which comes by grace – THEN works its way out – finds its expression – in our lives!
- It will always be seen in changed lives.
- Always expressed by love, by obedience... in terms of what James has already said so far in this letter – by caring for the marginalised, keeping a rein on your tongue (more of that next week); by treating all people the same... by keeping ourselves from being polluted by the world!
- **True** faith is **never alone**. //
- One more illustration.
- Rahab. You can read her story in Joshua 2. Rahab was a pagan prostitute. So she's not a Jew and her lifestyle is unacceptable.
- Yet she is credited with having a true faith a real trust... because when the spies who came to check out the promised land before God's people crossed over and went in... she helped them out by giving hospitality and helping them escape Jericho. She gave lodging to those in need.
- Whatever she **knew** of the one true God was **enough** for her to endanger her own life for the sake of God's people.

- Her faith moved from knowing there is one God... to trusting him for her life... and she was considered right with God on the basis of it.
- So James ends the section with another pithy summary in v26 – as the body without the spirit is dead, so faith without deeds is dead.
- As life consists of body + spirit, so true spiritual life consists of faith + deeds. ///
- Is your faith dead?
- I can't answer that for you.
- And it's not for me to judge.
- But Jesus said by their fruit you will know them. (Matthew 7:15-20). That is, whatever is in people's hearts will eventually be seen in their lives. Good tree, good fruit. Bad tree, bad fruit!
- If your <u>claim to have faith</u> never moves you from good intentions to loving actions... it could be dead.
- If your <u>claimed</u> faith is never seen outside the four walls of your church (or home), it could be dead
- It your <u>claim to have faith</u> doesn't move you to give to the poor, it could be dead

- If your <u>claim to have faith</u> doesn't move you to put your <u>life</u>, your <u>reputation</u>, your <u>popularity</u> on the <u>line</u> for <u>Jesus' sake</u>, it could just be <u>dead</u>.
- If your <u>claim to have faith</u> doesn't express itself in <u>dependent</u>
   prayer and heart-felt thanks it could be <u>dead</u>
- If you keep no rein on your tongue, if you show favouritism to the those from whom you hope to gain something... your faith could be dead
- If you are not loving your neighbour as yourself, your faith could be dead. ///
- You might say hang on a minute... I wouldn't be here in church would I, if my faith were dead?
- Mmm maybe.
- What if coming to church made you feel like your faith was real... but once you head home... it's never on your heart or mind until church next week...
- ... what would you say about 'faith' like **that**?
- What if you thought that just going to church, kind of kept God happy for the week... and that's all there was to it?
- What if you just thought going to church, made you appear respectable...?
- Yes I do think it is possible to be in church but have a faith which is just a 'claimed' faith. Not real. Not a real trust.

- But that's not my call.
- That's YOUR call.
- **IS** your faith dead?
- Or is it a real, lively, personal everyday trust in our great God and Father... and his Son the Lord Jesus Christ?
- Does that trust in him mean you live **his** way trusting his purposes?
- Does it mean you have **joy** and contentment in him even in the **hard** times?
- Does it mean you long for a transformed life which grows more like Jesus?
- Does it mean you hate sin and love godliness?
- Does it mean you increasingly want to **serve** God...?
- Serve his **people**.
- Help people everywhere in need.
- Does it mean you shun **materialism** and **greed**?
- Do battle with language and lust?
- Are you seeking to be a **peacemaker**?
- Longing for others to **know** Jesus as you know him?
- Seeking to wrestle with his word and kneel before him in prayer...

- Is your life more about **JESUS** than **anyONE** else more about Jesus than YOU - or any THING else...?
- Is Jesus not just **PART** of your life... but **IS** your life..? //
- Then friends if those things are true your trust is **real**... your **relationship** is real... your **claim** to **faith** is more than just a CLAIM...!
- For a faith that is **real** a faith that **saves** a faith which puts you right with God; is **NEVER alone** – it always means a transformed life... it is always written in a person's face and seen clearly in their lives...
- And I pray that more and more, our churches will be filled with people who have a faith – a trust - which is real and **deep** and **personal** // and is **changing** our **lives week** by week - month by month - so that we are the people God wants us to be...
- What good is it my brothers and sisters if a person **CLAIMS** to have faith, but has no deeds? - no outward expression shows no **evidence** in their **lives?**
- Can such faith save them?
- NO!
- But If your relationship with Jesus is **genuine**, it cannot **help** but make a difference in your life.
- Today. And every day!
